

Skiing in New England This Winter

It is no surprise that skiing this winter will be a lot different than previous winters. The days of just showing up at the mountain after a winter storm are over for



now. It is critical that, before making plans, you check the website for the mountain that you are considering, and in most cases buy your lift tickets online, and reserve parking if necessary. And if you plan to ski in New England you will need to quarantine.

Vermont Governor Phil Scott announced this month that all travelers to the state this winter have a choice – either plan to quarantine in Vermont for 14 days, or quarantine at home in your state for 7 days and get a COVID-19 test before arriving in Vermont. If you come using public transportation you will need to quarantine in Vermont.



New Hampshire has a similar program – either quarantine at home for 14 days and not use public transportation to travel to New Hampshire, or quarantine in your home state for 7 days and then get a molecular test (e.g. PCR-based test, not an antigen test) ‘immediately prior to arrival in NH’. Again, no public transportation to get to NH is assumed.

For Maine, there is no requirement to quarantine if you get a molecular test no more than 72 hours before you arrive in Maine.

All these requirements are subject to change so check with the state websites before you make plans.
